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### A 20 MPH City Public Consultation

### 1 Background

In May 2010, following an investigation into 20mph speed limits/zones by the Environment and Community Safety Overview and Scrutiny Committee (ECSOSC), the panel produced a report containing 15 recommendations. In broad terms the main recommendation was the wider implementation of 20mph speed restrictions in residential areas and in the vicinity of community facilities such as schools.

Cabinet Member Meeting in January 2012 approved the implementation of two pilot 20mph speed limit areas in Portslade and Stanford and directed officers to investigate the further possibility of the wider introduction of 20mph speed restrictions across the City.

Officers prepared an outline proposal for the phased introduction of 20mph speed restrictions across the City over a 4 year period, which were subject to public consultation between 27<sup>th</sup> June and 10<sup>th</sup> August 2012.

#### 2 Headline Results

55% of respondents are in support of the 20mph proposals.

Highest levels of support were shown by older residents (aged 65+) at 67.5%.

Business owners or managers show less support for 20mph proposals at 44% in favour.

#### 3 Methodology

Information leaflets and questionnaires were mailed to a random sample of 10,000 city-wide addresses. The addresses were taken from the Land and Property Gazeteer which is a property based database and both residential and commercial properties were included in the sample.

The consultation was also made publicly available on-line on the council's Consultation Portal.

Exhibitions were held in:

Hove Town Hall Monday 16 July 11am to 7pm

Tuesday 17 and Wednesday 18 July 10 am to 6pm

Brighton Town Hall Monday 23 July 11am to 7pm

Tuesday 24 and Wednesday 25 July 10 am to 6pm

The consultation was also advertised on the council's web-site and in the local press.

#### 4 Full Results

#### Response rate

3689 responses were received in total, 1564 of these (42.5%) were received on-line through the council's consultation portal and 2125 (57.5%) were survey forms returned by mail or collected at public exhibitions.

The paper-based version of the survey alone yielded around 21% response rate.



Percentage levels of support for 20 mph overall and for older residents, or those with disabilities and those with children. All these groups show levels of support ranging from 56.5% to 67.5%: all higher than the 55% support shown by all respondents. The group which shows the lowest level of support for 20 mph proposals are business owners or managers at 44%, which has the effect of suppressing overall levels of support down to 55%






# 1) Top 5 comments made by all respondents
